

Field Experience Reflections

Essential Question: What does the Hillsborough River Watershed mean to you?

Objective: The student will write a reflection of the day's activities.

Standard(s):

Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development, organization, and style are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.

Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of discipline-specific tasks, purposes, and audiences.

Materials:

1. A journal with at least six pages; could be store bought, made by stapling paper together, or just a section of a class folder or binder.
2. 3,2,1 prompt sheet

Time: 5 to 10 minutes upon return from their Field Study

Directions: Ask the students to respond to a 3, 2, 1 prompt upon their return from their Field Study.

- Write 3 new things you learned
- Write 2 interesting facts from your experience
- Explain how one of the things you recorded above is important in your life

Options for final question:

- What have you changed your mind about as a result of this experience? Use details from your experience to support your response.
- What issue interests you that you would like to study further? Why? Use details from your experience to support your response.
